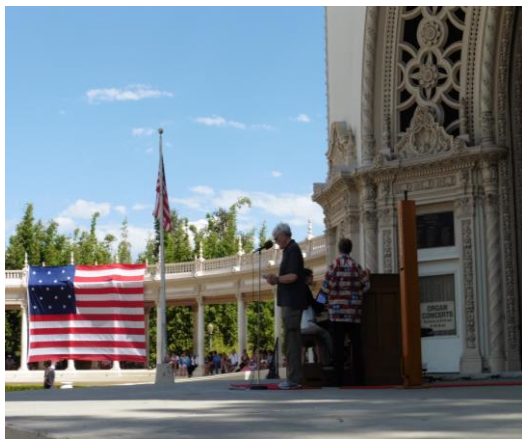

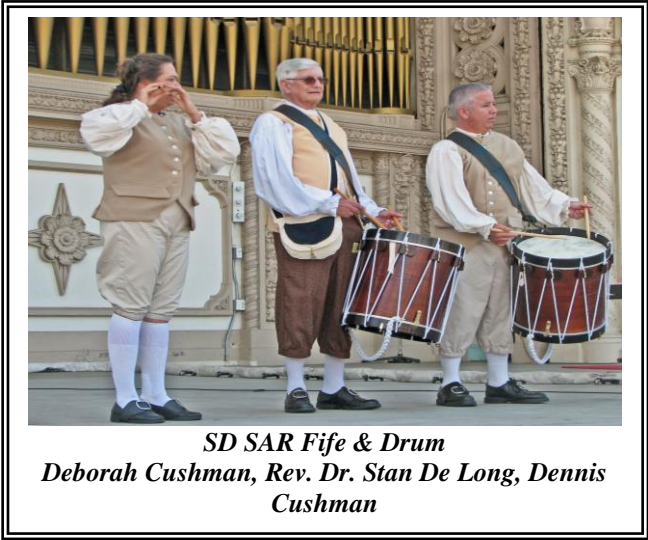

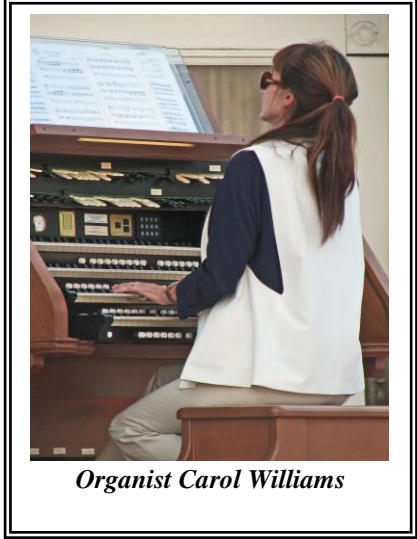


Pavilion with Flag

Spreckels Organ Pavilion

The Spreckels Organ and Pavilion were donated to the City of San Diego by John D. and Adolph Spreckels and dedicated on December 31, 1914, preceding the formal opening of the Panama-California Exposition. The unique outdoor Spreckels Organ Pavilion was designed by Los Angeles architect Harrison Albright. The organ was built by Austin Organ Company of Hartford, Connecticut. It originally contained 52 ranks and by 1996 had grown to 73 ranks or over 4,500 pipes ranging in length from 32 feet to "about the size of a pencil". The Spreckels Organ, one of a few municipally owned and operated organs in continuous use, is one of the great concert organs of the world, capable of the full range of musical masterworks.

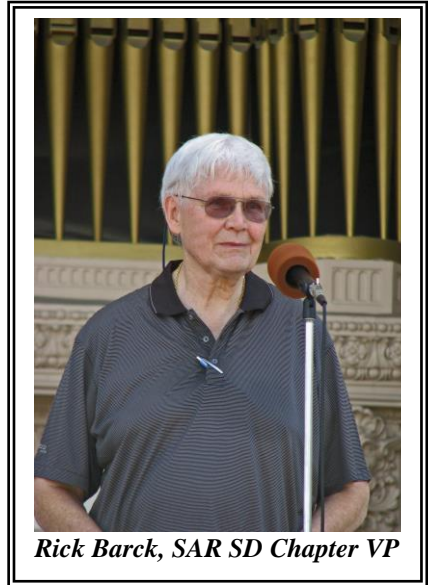

Star Spangled Banner Remarks at Organ Pavilion September 14, 2014

Presented by Richard Barck, San Diego SAR

You see before you a “Storm Flag” which flew over Fort McHenry at the Battle of Baltimore & Fort McHenry 200 years ago. Less than 10 days before the British Army under a charismatic General had sacked and burned Washington, including the White House and major government buildings. President Madison and officials had been forced to flee.

In overabundant confidence, the British proclaimed their march on Baltimore and sent the British Fleet to destroy Fort McHenry and support their 2,000 troops as they occupied Baltimore. Our nation’s independence was hanging by a thin thread!

The British Fleet arrived with over 50 ships and 1200 British Marines. They attacked the Fort with mortars, rockets and cannon-balls designed to explode in air, raining shrapnel onto soldiers below, but the cannon from the Fort drove them back. They fired some 1800 rounds at the Fort and launched the Marines during a storm-filled night. The storm flag flew all night and could be seen by the “rocket’s red glare”.

In the morning, the British Fleet Commander surveyed the scene – ships damaged; unable to pass the Fort; only some 200 Marines returning (700 killed, 300 captured) and watched “by the dawn’s early light” as the Fort dropped the Storm Flag and raised the Garrison Flag (30’ x 45’) with the Fort’s Fife and Drum Corps playing “Yankee Doodle”. The Fleet raised anchor and retreated to the open sea. The British Army – with no sea support and drenched by the storm, without food and shelter and no dry powder – also retreated, their General felled by musket shots. Our young nation was saved!

Francis Scott Key had watched the battle from a British warship where he had negotiated an exchange of prisoners, but was held until after the battle. His poem/lyrics became the libretto to a popular tavern song, “To Anacrea in Heaven” and which became known as our National Anthem – The Star Spangled Banner.

By proclamation of the President of the U.S. and the Mayor of San Diego, join with the SAR, the DAR, the Organ Society and the Nation, let this be a day of celebration!

Star Spangled Banner Remarks at Organ Pavilion September 14, 2014

September 14, 2014 marks the 200th Anniversary of the Battle of Baltimore during which Francis Scott Key wrote the Star Spangled Banner which officially became our National Anthem in 1931. Off to your left you will note the replica of the 1814 Star Spangled Banner service flag that was flown the night of September 13, 1814 and this particular flag has also been flown at Fort McHenry, The Midway Museum on June 14th and today - here at the Spreckel's Organ Pavilion.

In the summer of 1813, Mary Pickersgill was contracted to sew two flags for Fort McHenry in Baltimore, Maryland as she was an experienced maker of ships' colors and signal flags. She filled orders for many of the military and merchant ships that sailed into Baltimore's busy port.

The one that became the Star-Spangled Banner was 30' x 42' - a Garrison flag; the other, the smaller of the two was a 17' x 25 foot storm flag for use in inclement weather which is the same size and design as the one that you see hanging from the Pavilion. Both flags were made out of wool and stitched together with over

1 Million stitches by Pickersgill, a thirty-seven-year-old widow, along with her (13) year-old daughter Caroline; nieces Eliza Young (also 13) and Margaret Young (15); and a thirteen-year-old African American indentured servant, Grace Wisher. They spent about seven weeks making the two flags remembering this was in the heat and humidity - in a warehouse during a typical Baltimore summer. They assembled the blue canton and the red and white stripes of the flag by piecing together strips of loosely woven English wool bunting that were only 24 inches wide. The White Spangled Stars 2 feet in diameter were placed on the blue canton. When you hear the word "Spangled" it meant that the stars were placed on a very noticeable angle to bring attention to them as if they would be dancing or sparkling.

This is the same Flag design that Frances Scott Key saw from afar and inspired him to write the Star Spangled Banner. Proclamations have been written by the President of the United States and also our Mayor Kevin Faulconer. Mayor Faulconer has proclaimed in this document that this is Star Spangled Banner Day on behalf of the DAR, SAR and the Spreckel's Organ Society!

I would personally like to thank the Sons of the American Revolution for your contributions of this day and Carol for her graciousness in letting this event happen and all the volunteers that have helped to day to make this event so memorable!

How many verses of anthem do you know? Crowd sings to honor Star-Spangled Banner's birthday

Two hundred years ago, a young lawyer imprisoned on a British ship watched helplessly as the single fort standing between the city of Baltimore and the British fleet was bombarded.

“The fight went on to pass Fort McHenry all day and all night,” said Richard Barck, a vice president of the Sons of the American Revolution’s San Diego Chapter. “Mortars, rockets, bombs bursting in air... that continued throughout the night, and by the rocket’s red glare, Francis Scott Key said, ‘I can see the flag is still there.’”

The morning after the barrage, Sept. 14, a massive American flag was raised, an undeniable symbol of the fort’s survival. The British fleet retreated. Key penned a poem, impassioned by the victory, that would become the country’s national anthem — “The Star-Spangled Banner.”

At a Spreckles Organ Pavilion concert Sunday, an audience of more than 100 sang the anthem to celebrate its 200th birthday — and not just the first verse. Unbeknown to some, the anthem has four verses, although the first verse is the one commonly belted by soloists at sporting events. The musical homage was organized by the San Diego chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Other well-loved patriotic tunes were played by city organist Carol Williams, including “America, The Beautiful,” “You’re a Grand Old Flag,” “Yankee Doodle Dandy,” and “Take Me Out to the Ballgame,” (which, while not specifically patriotic, is a very American song.)

But the shining star of the ensemble was the anthem in its entirety. As the song’s familiar first notes resonated from the organ, audience members stood, their hands on their hearts. “I think the gravity of these words resonate with people, and their power has lasted for 200 years,” said Kathleen Winchester, regent of the local Daughters of the American Revolution said of the lyrics. Organizers handed out lyrics sheets for the crowd to sing along, but the impromptu chorus struggled with the unfamiliar verses that follow the beginning everyone knows. (See below.) Marilyn Orbann, who attended the concert with her husband Carl, sat in the sparse shade of a fledgling tree and cooled herself with an American flag-themed fan. She and her husband are both retired Navy Officers. Marilyn said during their many tours overseas, the flag and the national anthem represented a home. “I even cry when I sing the national anthem,” she said. “It’s the ultimate symbol of patriotism.”

WHEREAS, the Star Spangled Banner was declared as our National Anthem by President Herbert Hoover on March 3, 1931; and


WHEREAS, the Star Spangled Banner is sung or played at the beginning of sporting and public events as a reaffirmation of patriotism and love of country; and

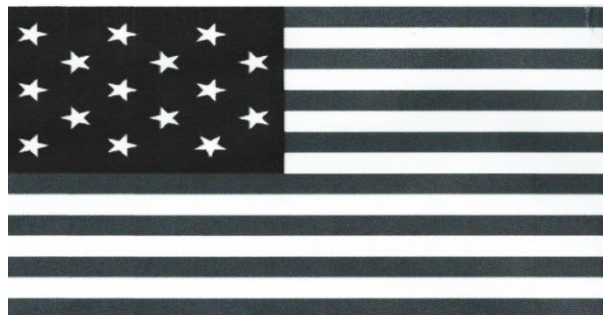

Among the first of Balboa Park's cultural gems, thanks to the vision of brothers **Adolph** and **John D. Spreckels**, this gift to the people of San Diego is a pipe organ that can perform the full range of musical masterworks. Built by the Austin Organ Co. of Hartford, CT, the Spreckels Organ was deeded to the City on January 1, 1915 at the opening of the Panama-California Exposition and has played steadily ever since. Today it contains some 4,518 pipes, comprising 73 ranks. The organ is maintained by L. W. Blackinton and Associates, Inc; Lyle Blackinton and Dale Sorenson, Co-Curators, who are at work to install the new Centennial Tuba pipe rank and the Gamba and Gamba Celeste pipe ranks that have been funded by member contributions during the past year. These are the first stages of the "Drive to 5,000 Pipes" that will make the Spreckels Organ once again the world's largest outdoor pipe organ. These new elements and more will be dedicated at the special Centennial Concert on the evening of December 31, 2014.



In 2001, British born **Carol Williams** was the first woman to be appointed **Civic Organist**. She graduated with top honors from London's Royal Academy of Music and continued her education in France. Subsequent studies were at Yale University, and she earned her Doctorate of Music at the Manhattan School of Music in New York City. Her concerts continue to take her to places such as Europe, China, Russia, and the Far East, as well as throughout the USA. Dr. Williams is the Artistic Director at the Spreckels Organ Society, helping create the world's largest pipe organ festival every summer, and is coordinating the great Centennial Concert here on December 31. 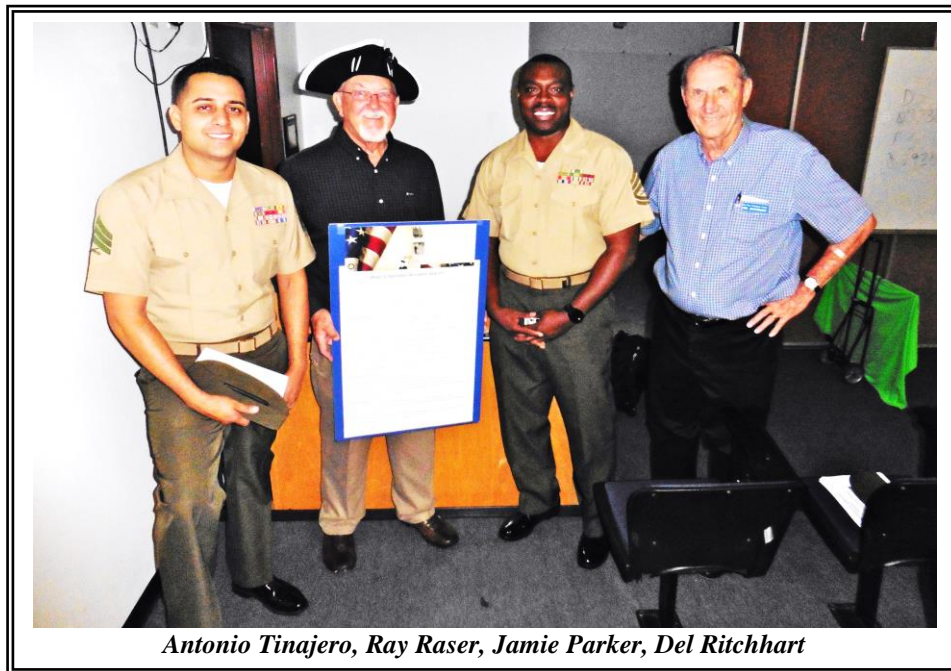
